State of the City of Cohoes for 2009

John McDonald, Mayor of the City of Cohoes, spoke to the Rotary Club of Cohoes regarding the State of the City of Cohoes. He began by stating that on Tuesday, February 10th he will make his annual 'State of the City' address to the Cohoes City Council. The purpose of today's presentation was to provide our club a preview of what his remarks will include.

These are difficult times for small cities like Cohoes. In the Mayor's opinion, the city workforce is not too fat. At the same time the city is sensitive to the tax burden that taxpayers in the City of Cohoes have. Consequently, it is a balancing act to keep expenditure levels and the real property tax levy in proportion with one another. He also mentioned that in Cohoes (what he called City Finances 101) that the city Council and taxpayers have developed a better understanding what money is being spent on.

For the first time, this year there will be no increase in city aid form the State of New York. The City of Cohoes has a 20 million dollar budget. At the same time, the City made a conscious decision not to cut expenditures for public safety (police and fire) or economic development.

They are looking at shared services as a way to contain raising costs. One way is for city departments to work collectively to purchase items in bulk so that the per unit cost will be less, e.g. paper. On a larger scale, they are looking at ways to provide services more efficiently through inter-municipal cooperation.

For example, they are looking at county wide assessing, and county wide 911 dispatching. Currently if someone in Cohoes calls '911' the call is routed to Voorheesville, who in-turn sends the call to the appropriate place in Cohoes. The City wants to change the '911' process so that primary response points are used instead. Under this plan, the '911' call would be routed directly to the right place in Cohoes in the first instance.

They are also in discussion with the City of Watervliet regarding either merging fire departments, or coordinating with each other for more effective coverage. In the City of Cohoes, the fire department has a 3.9 million dollar budget, of which over 93% of personal services. A coordinated effort may be more efficient. The Mayor did acknowledge that there is some resistance to this effort.

The City departments of: Zoning, Planning and Zone Enforcement were merged into a single Department of Building and Planning. The City has also instituted cost savings by using information technology (IT), and is conducting reviews of all City buildings to determine how energy efficient they are and where costs could be saved by making them more energy efficient.

City water and sewer cost and rates are also being reviewed. For the last three years, the city general fund has had to support the sewer and water funds.

A conscious effort is being made to reduce the cost of health insurance for city employees. For example, City Council members decided that since they are only part-time, the City will not pay for health insurance for them.

Police and fire department services are gong well. The number of arrests, and the number of fire calls are declining. However, the number of EMS calls are on the rise. The Mayor also mentioned the rehabilitated fire house on Van Schaick Island will reopen in April 2009. The city has also received funding to replace the bridge on Bridge Avenue. The 9.1 million dollar project will begin in April 2009 and finish in May 2010.

The City has begun vacant building registration. Currently they have 20 vacant buildings. The idea is that each of them should be stabilized, rehabilitated or demolished.

The bad economy has made economic development more challenging. Since banks are more reluctant to lend people money, people wanting to start small businesses find it harder to obtain funding. Fortunately, the City of Cohoes has built up its commercial base over the last four to five years. In years past, these efforts have been very successful. From 2005 to 2007, 100 million dollars in investments have been made.

The Eddy Project is going very well. The City has also received a \$400,000 grant to make homes in the city of middle and low income people safer to live in and more energy efficient.

There is a committee working on making proposed revisions to the city charter so that language will be simpler and less restrictive. A report is expected by the end of June 2009. Another committee is working on preparations for the 2010 decennial census. It is hoped that the city's numbers will increase for 2010.

Falls Park opened in 2008, and in 2009 the next phase of the project will begin. Visitors will be able to go to the base of the Cohoes Fall.

In closing, the Mayor reiterated that the current economic climate is grim, but that there is light at the end of the tunnel!
