ROTARY'S WHEEL EMBLEM

A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement."

Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus, in 1923, the present gear wheel, with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the "Rotary International Association."

A group of engineers advised that the geared wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem.

The Gift of Life (GOL) program was started in 1975 by a Rotarian. There are currently 64 countries with GOL programs. The program arranges for children suffering from congenital heart defects to receive life saving surgeries. The GOL Albany funds 4-5 operations per year at Albany Med. Each operation costs \$10,000, this expense comes solely from the operating room rental from Albany Med. In comparison, other hospitals charge \$5,000 room rental rate for charitable organizations such as, GOL. All other expenses are donated such as, doctors and staff time, traveling costs, and family housing.

A movie was played summarizing the GOL programs. The sole mission of the GOL program is to save a life of a child. In 2008, the 10,000th child was treated in GOL program.

The program not only allows children who would otherwise die from their heart condition a second chance at life, but it also builds goodwill toward the United States worldwide. The children treated and their families act as ambassadors for the US.

The Albany GOL program sent a team of US doctors and support staff to the Dominican Republic to perform 8-10 cardiac surgeries and 6 other operations in one week. All of the participants were from Albany Med, using their personal vacation time. The total cost of the trip was \$30,000.

Fundraising is the largest challenge for every GOL program. Money is the most useful contribution each Rotary club can provide. Rotary clubs can provide services other than money by sponsoring a child during their visit to Albany Med. Sponsoring a child includes, visitation time while in the hospital, providing transportation, being the child's advocate at the hospital and acting as a liaison between the child and the hospital staff. There are 22 board members on the GOL Albany program and it is logistically challenging for many of them to be at Albany Med to provide these needed services.

Currently, there is a 4 year old girl from Jamaica being treated at Albany Med. She has had some post surgical complications and is suffering from a collapsed lung.

Other groups that the GOL Albany program associates with included, GOL International and Samaritans Purse, who provide the airfare and a liaison for the patient and their family.d
