## Club Business:

The next 50/50 raffle will be an Easter raffle. Tickets will be mailed to members. The winner will receive half the proceeds raised and an Easter basket. Ed and Linda Tremblay will be attending PETS in Syracuse on March 18.

## Program:

Joseph Seman-Graves, City Planner for the City of Cohoes, gave an overview of some of the projects he is working on for the City. As City Planner, Joe reviews buildings and businesses coming into Cohoes. He reaches out to property owners who have vacant buildings, working with them to get the buildings occupied. Two years ago there were 260 vacant

buildings in Cohoes. This year that number has been reduced to 140 vacant buildings. The City purchased new residential recycling bins. All the City street lights are now owned by the City of Cohoes and have been converted to LED, saving Cohoes \$350,000 a year. That savings was bonded and used as match for other grants. The walkable Remsen Street Corridor project is finished, installing new sidewalks and bringing utilities to the site where the fire occurred on Remsen Street. The City of Cohoes has a \$4.9 million grant to repave Columbia Street and add sidewalks. The work being done between Trull Street and Broadway is a different grant. An additional \$279,000 grant will work on streetscapes from Saratoga Street to Spring Street. In the spring a pocket park will be constructed on the corner of White and Remsen Street as part of grants totaling \$670,000 to do streetscapes from Mohawk Street to Main Street. The administration has secured grants to restore the Cohoes Library, the Cohoes Music Hall, and Cohoes City Hall. It will cost \$1.7 million to replace the roof, \$1 to upgrade the heating and cooling, and \$3 million dollars to replace the windows in City Hall. Repair to the roof of the Cohoes Music Hall will cost \$1 million and upgrading the heating and cooling will cost \$1.3 million. Geo thermal will be used to heat and cool the Music Hall. The Cohoes Public Library needs \$1 million in various upgrades. The floating solar panel project on the reservoir will power Cohoes municipal buildings. A \$1.1 million grant will be used to design a waterfront park on Delaware Avenue. Greenbrier and Sunset Parks have been upgraded. Joe gave credit to Theresa Bourgeois, former Operations Manager for the City of Cohoes, for securing most of the grant funding.
